THE OC DIAPER BANK CELEBRATES FUNDING SUCCESS

We are proud to share that with the generous support of OC Diaper Bank champions, Community Action Partnership of Orange County (CAP OC) has received nearly \$2.5 million to keep the OC Diaper Bank operating at capacity through June 30, 2026. As a crucial safety net for vulnerable families, the OC Diaper Bank has received significant community support from the California Legislature, the Sun Family Foundation, and the County of Orange to ensure operations continue to support more than 80 distribution partners, serving 10,000 children each month.

CAP OC left no stone unturned in our efforts to save the OC Diaper Bank as budget shortfalls at the state level stifled plans of continued service. Thanks to incredible state-level advocacy from Senator Tom Umberg and Assemblymember Avelino Valencia, the state of California dedicated \$9 million in funding to be allocated to 11 diaper banks across the state, providing nearly \$820,000 to the OC Diaper Bank to fund operations for a two year period.

In order to sustain the same level of capacity, it was important to secure additional funds. Our dedicated advocacy campaign resulted in an outpour of support, receiving \$1 million from the Sun Family Foundation, \$500,000 in discretionary funding from Orange County Supervisors Don Wagner and an additional \$100,000 from Supervisor Doug Chaffee, and \$200,000 from First 5 Orange County.

While this funding ensures continued services for the next two years, our advocacy and education campaigns

are just getting started. CAP OC is actively seeking out three possible solutions to ensure the ongoing operations of the OC Diaper Bank. The first avenue we are advocating for is to establish the Diaper Bank Network as an official state program. This effort would create a new line item in the state budget, reducing the likelihood of the program being cut in the future. Additionally, CAP OC is exploring options to include diapers as an eligible benefit for MediCal recipients. Our hope is that by securing this resource as a benefit, our current diaper bank network can serve as no-cost providers, routing costs through MediCal. Lastly, outside of legislative solutions, we will continue to work alongside our dedicated partners, including the Sun Family Foundation and First 5 OC, to help raise awareness and philanthropic support for this critical need.

As we continue efforts for long-term funding solutions, we share our deepest appreciation for the incredible support we have received from Senator Tom Umberg, Assemblymember Avelino Valencia, OC Supervisors Wagner and Chaffee, the Sun Family Foundation and First 5. Their generous support has ensured an additional two years of full-capacity diaper distribution through the OC Diaper Bank. As our work continues, we hope to find long-term funding solutions to sustain the OC Diaper Bank Program and support young families across Southern California.



UNDERSTANDING ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH HAZARDS

Community Action Partnership of Orange County's (CAP OC) Energy and Environmental Services (EES) Department is conducting pivotal research to better understand environmental injustices impacting the communities we serve. Through a three phase Health Equity Zones (HEZ) initiative that began in 2022, our team has undertaken significant research to achieve healthy, systemic changes at the local level.

CAP OC has identified zones of interest around its four physical service areas: three family resource centers and its main office. These regions not only represent four of our five top-served cities agencywide, but also the top five cities that benefit from our Weatherization program, providing a direct link between our services and our research.

This summer the EES Department finalized findings related to Phase One of the HEZ initiative, understanding socioeconomic and environmental vulnerabilities. By utilizing data from various public resources including the Environmental Protection Agency, the National Emissions Inventory, CalEnviroScreen 4.0, and the

Department of Toxic Substance Control, we have identified the pollution sources nearest each HEZ and the burden of pollution in each area

What we found was striking. After a thorough analysis, results indicated that all four HEZs were disproportionately exposed to toxic releases from facilities or manufacturing as well as particulate matter smaller than 2.5 microns. To supplement these findings, we have installed air monitoring equipment at the Southwest Community Center (SWCC) to measure the level of pollution inside and outside our center to better understand our community's risk.

As we continue this crucial research and enter Phase Two, researching the history of Orange County's development of various industries in disadvantaged communities, we hope to use these findings to inform our services. Through our EES programs, we can take active steps to alleviate environmental hazards many neighborhoods may be exposed to, working towards healthier outcomes for our entire community.

A SUMMER OF YOUTH EMPOWERMENT

While class was out for the summer, our Youth Services team was incredibly active, bringing insightful lessons to our Family Resource Center (FRC) youth.

To kick off the summer, we hosted our second annual Full STEAM Ahead conference, where teens and young adults engaged with our dynamic career panelists and speakers to learn about everything from careers in music and art to weatherization and utilities.

Following the conference, our teens took part in listening sessions about local community issues while our younger participants focused on building their own STEAM park. Both activities sparked curiosity and creativity in our youth, encouraging them to challenge their perspectives and work together to reach a collective outcome.

In addition to these activities, the summer's Empowered to Thrive curriculum focused on identity building using the My S.H.A.P.E. framework. This program, which has previously been used to help underserved teens explore who they are and what career they'd like to explore, incorporated weekly topics including specific intelligences, heart, abilities, personality, and experience.

Using engaging lessons and demonstrations, our teens and youth wrapped up their summer with a greater understanding of who they are and where they may want to go. As we shift into fall programming, we look forward to watching each of our participants reach their personal and professional goals.

THE OC HUNGER ALLIANCE BRINGS IN ADDITIONAL PARTNERS

The OC Hunger Alliance is leading the fight to address food insecurity through a dynamic partnership between Community Action Partnership of Orange County (CAP OC), Second Harvest Food Bank of Orange County, and Abound Food Care. Focusing on collaboration, instead of competition, these three agencies are actively seeking new ways to optimize their collective efforts.

In fact, earlier this year, the Alliance published an in-depth report outlining the need for food security, nutrition and access in Orange County with the support of Charitable Ventures. Receiving data from more than 189 community organizations and program participants, the report outlined important information about Orange County's food systems, highlighting areas of concern and opportunities for improvement. As Alliance members reviewed data and explored solutions, the findings coalesced into three high level recommendations that will shape the Alliance's upcoming work: promote food choice, champion

food benefit awareness and access, and strengthen systems of care.

To support these recommendations and seek more widespread action, the OC Hunger Alliance has also enhanced its member base, creating a steering committee of 5 new members from Orange County United Way, CalOptima Health, the Orange County Social Services Agency, Meals on Wheels OC, and OC Grantmakers. These additional organizations will not only provide insight into other service areas and populations, but bring new transformative ideas, working together to address food insecurity and poverty, more broadly.

As the OC Hunger Alliance continues to tackle obstacles of food security, it hopes that this new research will enhance its efforts to address poverty across service areas. Additionally, through expansion, leaders will be focused on new approaches, partnerships, and strategies to increase each organization's capacity and efficiency, working together towards a hunger-free Orange County.
