

A WORD FROM OUR LEADERSHIP



EMPOWERING RESILIENCE AMID INFLATION

EXPANDING CALOPTIMA COMMUNITY SUPPORTS

Our partnership with CalOptima Health expanded this year, introducing two additional community support services: Asthma Remediation & Environmental Accessibility Adaptations. With the addition of these services our Healthy Homes program can begin implementing environmental health measures designed to ensure the safety of those we serve.

ENHANCING OC DIAPER BANK OPERATIONS

In 2023 the OC Diaper Bank experienced significant growth with the addition of our second Tom Tom truck to assist with diaper deliveries. With this addition the OC Diaper Bank has successfully partnered with over 80 agencies to assist with distribution and reach upwards of 10,000 infants and young families monthly.

PROVIDING EMERGENCY WATER ASSISTANCE

With the success of our utility assistance programs, CAP OC was provided federal funding through the Low Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP) for the first time. With the support of local water providers enrolled in LIHWAP, we distributed \$2 million dollars in support funds to assist 2,700 households cover water bills and avoid service interruptions and evictions.

FULL STEAM AHEAD FOR OUR CENTER YOUTH

In June 2023, our Youth Services Program hosted our inaugural STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math) Conference, connecting program youth with business leaders across multiple industries. As a result of attendance, our teens had an overall increase of 57% in exploring the STEAM field for education and career opportunities.

CREATING NEW OPPORTUNITIES TO SUPPORT OUR COMMUNITY

INTRODUCING LENDING CIRCLES TO IMPROVE CREDIT

In 2023, we launched our first Lending Circle Program through Financial Empowerment. Utilized as an entrepreneurship tool, this program allows individuals to access small loans with 0% interest. This is particularly useful for those who have limited access to capital due to minimal credit history. By participating, individuals build personal credit while learning successful financial management to help achieve their financial goals. As of December 2023, two circles were formed with a combined total of 18 participants.

LAUNCHING PRODUCE PRESCRIPTION PROGRAM PILOT TO SUPPORT HEALTHY CHOICES

CAP OC's focus on nutrition was elevated in 2023 thanks to the launch of our three-year pilot OC Produce Prescription Program in collaboration with Ponderosa Health Clinic. This new program helps adults with diabetes access fresh produce boxes and grocery vouchers to lower A1C levels and improve health outcomes.


